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UNHCR Figures highlight need to support refugee host countries

While Australia's contribution to protecting refugees is significant, the largest numbers of the world's refugees are being hosted by countries much poorer than our own, the Refugee Council of Australia says.

Speaking on the eve of World Refugee Day (Saturday, June 20), Refugee Council CEO Paul Power said new statistics released by UNHCR highlighted that the great majority of the world's refugees seek protection in countries immediately next to their own.

UNHCR's "2008 Global Trends" shows that the countries hosting the largest numbers of refugees include Pakistan (1.78 million), Syria (1.1 million), Iran (980,000), Jordan (500,000), Chad (330,000) and Tanzania (322,000), with Germany (583,000) and the UK (292,000) the only OECD countries in the top ten. Australia is ranked 51st, with 20,919 refugees (0.2% of the global total). In per capita terms for hosting refugees, UNHCR ranks Australia 69th.

The UNHCR figures also reveal that, at the end of 2008, Australia had just 0.3% of the world's asylum seekers, 2,159 out of a global total of 827,323. Of the 535,950 asylum seekers recognised as refugees around the world during 2008, just 1,845 (0.3%) were in Australia.

However, Australia's involvement in refugee resettlement is much more significant. Australia welcomed 11,006 (12.4%) of the 88,800 refugees resettled during 2008, second to the United States which alone conducted 68% of the world's refugee resettlement (60,192 people).

In per capita terms, Australia was first for refugee resettlement and 39th for recognition of asylum seekers as refugees. When refugee recognition and resettlement figures for 2008 are combined, Australia was 12th numerically (12,851 out of 624,750 worldwide) and 17th in per capita terms.

"Australia's geography and its restrictive visa policies mean that the numbers of asylum seekers reaching this country are small in global terms," Mr Power said.

"Given that the great majority of the world's refugees seek asylum in countries within their immediate neighbourhood, a strong commitment by Australia to refugee resettlement is highly appropriate.

"There is a strong need for Australia to continue to advocate for other nations to increase their commitment to refugee resettlement. In 2008, just 0.8% of the world's refugees were resettled.

"These figures put recent debates about asylum seekers arriving by boat in perspective, showing that people movements to Australia are tiny in global terms. They also draw attention to the need for Australia to do everything possible to support humanitarian programs and refugee protection in the nations under greatest pressure from refugee movements."

Placards reading "Flowers in your hair, a peg on your Nose" and "Ban the Can" showed the determination of local families that led to the State Government legislation, the Springfield Improvement Act of 1958. A neighbourhood of many colours with people settling from across the globe to form what is now home to a thriving and dynamic community.
